GAINING PERSPECTIVE: THE IMPORTANCE OF DEVELOPING A LEGAL MIND

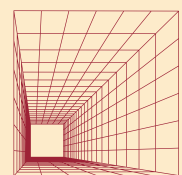
With the emergence of outsourced thinking, this article aims to highlight the importance of developing a legal mind in an era of artificial intelligence. I want to acknowledge that this piece of work has primarily been adapted from my internship research report.

Community legal centres (CLC's) are a form of accessible justice that is usually a first point of contact for many. CLC's are committed to supporting marginalised and low-income everyday Australians in areas of civil, criminal, and family law. With some even having dedicated teams for tenancy and Indigenous legal matters. In my time as an intake officer at the centre, I received a unique call from a client. He had received a sudden notice from restitutions demanding for the full amount in his matter payable in two weeks. He was reasonably shocked as it was originally reduced by 70% and decided to contact us for help in navigating the legal system. At face value it would not seem that we could take his matter on as it is outside of our scope. Upon probing further and viewing this through a money-owed lens, as opposed to criminal, we determined that we could take him on as a client and pursue his case under a new expansion of the Work and Development Orders (WDOs) scheme.

The scheme was first introduced in 2009 to help alleviate the overwhelm of fines for those meeting the eligibility criteria. The once temporary measure has been made a permanent solution in 2011 due to the over saturation of fines in NSW and even later expanded. This is telling of a deeper systemic inequality that requires more than just an equitable remedy to be addressed by a state that is a billion dollars in fine debt.

As law students, we are taught that the law embeds itself in all facets of a functioning society to preserve order and promote justice. With the permanence of this initiative reinforcing that, one would think that fine debt since 2011 has been mitigated and that the aforementioned billion is a figure of the past. Well, it's not. As the debt grew to \$1.2 billion in March of this year and is only now stabilising back down to that very same billion from 2022. Now yes, we should examine and understand the many factors the complicate debt management for a state such as NSW, but the focus here is our growth, not that of the state debt.

I want to turn your attention to the everyday Australian who is working hard for a fair go, they are your future client situated across from you, telling you their story. They rely on us to advocate for them as we have taken up the mantle once we entered this vocation to become future solicitors, barristers, judges, policy advisors and lawmakers. They seek out our service and expertise in navigating the system at the most vulnerable, high-risk moments of their lives. Therefore, it is imperative to make the most of the opportunity we are given as students. In developing our legal minds and honing our skills for analysing precisely what purpose a policy, scheme and legislative authority is trying to introduce.



GAINING PERSPECTIVE: THE IMPORTANCE OF DEVELOPING A LEGAL MIND



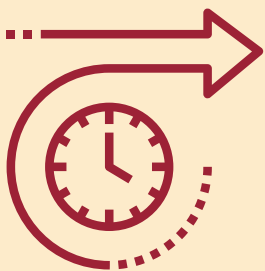
It is why when learning the foundations of law, we are first taught legislative principles and statutory interpretation on the onset. We learn that intention is embedded in the law to serve a particular purpose with a holistic aim of improving our society. Our mind is being trained into identifying issue(s) and overlaying a rule that encapsulates the position appropriately, where we, then, apply legal reasoning to analyse the unique facts of a scenario to arrive at a legally sound conclusion.



WDOs were introduced with the particular purpose of helping disadvantaged Australians work off their debt. They impose a social obligation for the individual to better themselves and, by extension, improve our society. Being the first point of contact at the CLC, our client's issue could have been incorrectly categorised had I not listened carefully and asked the right questions, both to him and to my supervisors. I documented the relevant facts to confirm his eligibility and once I advocated for his matter to be taken on, our team hit the ground running to offer the advice of pursuing a resolution through the WDO program for him.



This cognitive ability of learning to dissect a scenario will permeate into all aspects of life. It is a fundamental adaptable skill that follows you if you end up practicing law or another field entirely. It is a mental process that critically analyses and discerns to the heart of the problem in pursuit of extracting an actionable legal outcome for the client. That is what a legal mind ought to be. It needs to take everything presented to us by clients and synthesise the fragments of the story into a coherent narrative to distil a legal basis for us to pursue.



That is the value we bring, the one to pave the future, and one that is so human that it cannot be outsourced nor artificially replicated. Knowing of WDO's and how they work is only half of what we can bring. They are great for the people they support. But in understanding the "why" of it our current legal system benefits. We can contribute even further as we challenge and develop the policies and mechanisms for the better, for both our client and the everyday Australian.

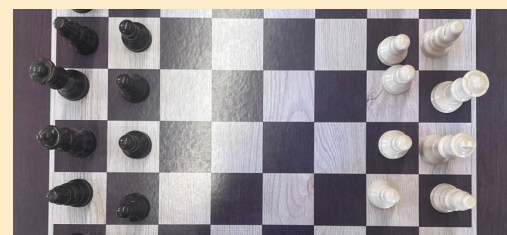

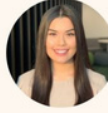
